Mr Ivan Greguric ACU Student – BA LLB

Ivan was awarded the ACU Ramsay Scholarship and is in his first year of Bachelor of Arts (Western Civilisation) Bachelor of Laws degree. He is an active member of student life on campus as the Secretary of the Liberal Arts Society, a member of Life Choice North Sydney and is in the process of establishing a Liberal Club starting in 2024.

Ivan was a Chorister in the St Mary's Cathedral Choir during his primary and secondary education, and is involved in his local parish, running Children's Liturgy and Altar Serving regularly.

The Hon Martin Daubney AM KC ACU Chancellor

The Honourable Martin Daubney AM KC is the fifth Chancellor of Australian Catholic University (ACU).

He served as a judge of the Supreme Court of Queensland from 13 July 2007 to 31 December 2021. He was also President of the Queensland Civil and Administrative Tribunal from October 2017 until November 2021.

He has served on a wide range of community and philanthropic boards, including two terms on the Senate of the University of Queensland and his current appointment as a member of the Queensland Art Gallery Board of Trustees.

Mr Daubney has served the Catholic Archdiocese of Brisbane on the Archdiocesan Finance Council (since 2011; Chair since 2018). He was National Vice-President and Queensland Chair of the Australian Association of the Sovereign Military Order of Malta (2009-2014; 2016-2017).

Keynote speakers





The Hon Chris Bowen MP Minister for Climate Change and Energy

Chris grew up in Smithfield in Western Sydney, attending Smithfield Public School and St Johns Park High School. He graduated from the University of Sydney with a Bachelor of Economics. He also has a Master's Degree in International Relations and a Diploma in Modern Languages (Bahasa Indonesia).

He joined the Labor Party in 1988 and was elected to Fairfield Council in 1995, serving as Mayor of Fairfield 1998 and 1999. He also served as President of the Western Sydney Regional Organisation of Councils from 2000 to 2002.

Chris entered Parliament in 2004 and has held a range of portfolios including serving as Treasurer, Minister for Human Services, Minister for Immigration, and Minister for Small Business.

He is currently the Minister for Climate Change and Energy.



The Hon Peter Dutton MP Leader of the Opposition

Peter Dutton is the Federal Member for Dickson and Leader of the Liberal Party.

Peter began his working life working part time after school in a butchers shop, mowing lawns and throwing newspapers until starting university. He started a small family business which grew to proudly employ 40 Australians.

For nine years, Peter served his community as a Queensland Police Officer. He worked in the National Crime Authority and Drug and Sex Offenders' Squads, with a focus on protecting women and children.

First elected to the Australian Parliament in November 2001 at age 30, Peter became one of the youngest Ministers since Federation when appointed to the Ministry by Prime Minister John Howard in 2004. In January 2006, he was promoted to become Peter Costello's Assistant Treasurer.

Following the 2007 election, Peter served as Shadow Minister for Finance, Competition Policy and Deregulation, and Shadow Minister for Health and Ageing.

In the nine years following the Coalition's return to Government in 2013, Peter held a number of major portfolios.

He was a member of the National Security Committee of Cabinet for a marathon six years, and also served on the Expenditure Review Committee and leadership teams.

Most recently, Peter served as Minister for Defence. In this role, he delivered record funding and secured the vital equipment our service personnel need to keep our country safe.

Previously, he served as the inaugural Home Affairs Minister in its modern form from December 2017, with responsibility for the Australian Federal Police, Australian Border Force, Australian Security Intelligence Organisation, Australian Criminal Intelligence Commission and the Australian Transaction Reports and Analysis Centre.

Peter has also previously served as the Minister for Immigration and Border Protection, deporting criminals and overseeing Operation Sovereign Borders, and Minister for Health and Minister for Sport, where he established the \$20 billion Medical Research Future Fund.

Peter is married to Kirilly and is the proud father of Rebecca, Harry and Tom and lives in Dayboro in the Dickson electorate.

Om Dyauh Shanti is the prayer from Yajur Veda. This is the universal peace prayer. We all are connected, the sky, the earth, the nature and everything there. We pray for peace inside and outside. Shanti mantra is chanted to calm the mind of the reciter and the nature around her/him. Traditionally, a Shanti mantra ends with three recitations of "Shanti", which is believed to remove obstacles and calm the three reals: Physical, Divine, and Internal.

Look at [each of] its fruit when it yields and [at] it's ripening. Indeed in that are signs for a people who believe." Quran, 6:99

"And there is no creature on [or within] the earth or bird that flies with its wings except [that they are] communities like you. We have not neglected in the Register a thing. Then unto their Lord they will be gathered." Quran, 6:38

God talks about the beauty of his creations both on land, sea, and the skies, and he talks of the similarities and bridge between humans and animals through communities. The Qur'an reminds us about how the rights of all creations need to be respected.

"Remember when your Lord said to the angels, I am going to place a successive human authority on earth." Quran 2:30
