ACCREDITATION

The Bachelor of Commerce is accredited by EPAS, a prestigious international program accreditation system operated by the European Foundation for Management Development. Graduates with an accounting major and the accounting accreditation minor are eligible for membership with CPA Australia, Chartered Accountants Australia and New Zealand and Institute of Public Accountants. Graduates with a human resource management major are eligible for graduate membership with the Australian Human Resources Institute and graduates in marketing are eligible for membership with the Australian Marketing Institute.

ACCOUNTING AND FINANCE CAREERS

Accounting is the backbone of the business world. A company's financial health is a key indicator of its success and without accountants making the numbers work, it's impossible for a business to thrive. Regardless of the economic outlook, accountants are always in demand and can be found in every industry, working for the government, large accounting firms, public companies, or small businesses. Successful accounting professionals have a strong grasp of economic patterns, keep up with the state of the investment industry, and have a talent for saving and spending money wisely. Day to day, a finance employee could track how an organisation is spending and borrowing money, negotiate financial contracts, record financial transactions, or prepare reports in line with organisational strategies.

Career paths in accounting and finance include:

- chartered and financial accountant
- finance manager
- financial adviser
- auditor
- chief financial officer
- tax agent or taxation accountant
- investment analyst
- bank manager, investment banker, or merchant banker
- management accountant
- stock exchange broker, foreign exchange broker, or analyst.

EVENT MANAGEMENT CAREERS

Event managers are multi-skilled problem solvers who organise a range of different events.

Events usually begin with conceptualising an occasion with the client's objectives in mind, before beginning to plan and coordinate with a range of different stakeholders. Once these initial decisions have been made, an event manager may be required to organise permits from regulatory authorities, visualise stage design, arrange for performers and media promoters, prepare run sheets, and finally, oversee the smooth operation of the event from start to finish.

The best event managers succeed through strong communication, creative vision, good organisation, and

attention to detail. Thinking big comes with the territory, along with the ability to visualise concepts, motivate people, and being able to collaborate effectively with all kinds of personalities.

Career paths in event management include:

- event coordinator or planner
- sports event manager
- wedding planner
- fashion event planner
- corporate event manager
- tourism event coordinator.

HUMAN RESOURCE MANAGEMENT

A business is only as good as its employees, and its employees are only as good as their HR team. This is why human resource management plays a critical role in every organisation – and why it's a rapidly growing profession. Career trend experts predict human resource management jobs are only going to increase in the future, along with a HR professional's median annual income.

If you're considering a HR career, start by evaluating your abilities and willingness to work closely with others. While good people skills are an in-demand attribute across every type of industry, it's particularly critical for anyone entering this field. You need to genuinely care about the wellbeing and development of employees, which often results in close working relationships with people across the entire spectrum of an organisation.

A HR professional's tasks can include recruitment, talent training and development, employee relation management, and implementing compensation and benefit schemes.

Career opportunities cover a wide range of jobs, including:

- policy administrator
- recruitment and selection consultant
- corporate training officer
- occupational health and safety manager
- learning, training and development consultant
- payroll and personnel manager.

INFORMATICS

Careers in informatics are in great demand in Australia and around the world. These IT skills are highly transferable and continuously growing and developing.

IT specialists can be self-employed or work for a large organisation in the public or private sector. Some IT careers focus on specific areas like security systems, quality assurance, or developing new ways to help businesses succeed.

MANAGEMENT CAREERS

Management is about managing people, systems and culture within both public and private organisations. It's about inspiring others to excel, creating excellence in all areas of business.

Careers in management are very varied across the business spectrum.

Careers can include:

- administration or office manager
- international trade executive
- general management
- director
- account manager
- CEO.

MARKETING CAREERS

Marketers are the ultimate go-betweens in the business world, responsible for bringing brands and consumers together. Their job is to get inside a customer's head and present solutions to their predicted wants and needs, while being faithful brand champions at all times. Marketing professionals shape how we see the world and it's a dynamic career that suits people drawn to strategising and identifying patterns and trends. Marketers typically approximate the need for products or services, identify potential markets for products or services, monitor trends, develop pricing and sales strategies, and work with staff in public relations, product development, and sales. Often marketers are people-oriented and can be called upon to bring the creativity to a project.

Pursuing marketing studies can lead to working in media, publishing, PR, and retail as brand managers, advertising executives, or event managers. But like the degree itself, marketing is a broad career path with many options. As marketing jobs can be found across every industry, where you choose to focus your skills is up to you.

MINORS

Data analytics

The art of collecting and analysing data enables an organisation to better understand and fine-tune their marketing, insurance, political, and/or business practices. Data analysts are highly trained professionals who perform the analysis and run various mathematical calculations to determine how data samples might best be applied to profit a business.

If you also have an excellent eye for detail, can identify trends and patterns of information, and have good computer skills, then data analysis could be your niche.

As a minor, not only will it complement other business majors and degrees, it will also provide graduates with a competitive edge.

Entrepreneurship

Entrepreneurship’s focus on innovation and disruption is a drawcard for students who like to think big and focus on possibility. The buzz surrounding entrepreneurship mostly comes from the technology-driven start-ups that have shaken up traditional industries like education, transport,

food production, and sustainable construction.

While start-ups are where most of us think the new breed of entrepreneurs can be found, in reality, many also start small family businesses or social enterprises. There are no set rules for who can become an entrepreneur. Rather, a good business idea backed up by focused determination is what sets them apart. Creativity, resourcefulness, and good communication also stands entrepreneurs in good stead, as well as a willingness to work hard and evaluate risks to accomplish goals.

Indigenous business studies

CERTIFICATE IN COMMERCE

Campus: Brisbane, Melbourne, North Sydney

If you're aspiring to develop a business career, but unable to get into university in the usual way, then our Certificate in Commerce could be the answer.

Applicants for this course will be considered based on their previous studies, work experience, community engagement activities, and any other relevant information that tells us you have the drive and the capacity to succeed in an undergraduate business course. The course does not have an entry ATAR/OP.

The Certificate in Commerce provides a broad understanding of key commercial and business concepts. It is a non-award course, meaning you will not gain a formal qualification at the end. You will, however, be able to study units (subjects) available in the Bachelor of Commerce – and on successful completion you can apply for entry into the bachelor degree. And if you are a domestic, fee-paying student, you will be granted credit for the units you've successfully completed.

CERTIFICATE IN BUSINESS INFORMATION SYSTEMS

Campus: North Sydney

The Certificate in Business Information Systems provides a broad understanding of how information technology is applied in a business environment. It is a non-award course, meaning you will not gain a qualification at the end. You will, however, be able to study units (subjects) available in the Bachelor of Information Technology – and you can apply for entry into the bachelor degree once you have successfully completed two units.

The Certificate in Business Information Systems provides an alternative pathway into the Bachelor of Information Technology for domestic students.

NON-SCHOOL LEAVERS SPECIAL DIRECT ENTRY PROGRAM

ACU welcomes non-school leavers. We believe you have the potential to bring a wealth of experience into the classroom.

The Faculty of Law and Business offers direct entry for domestic non-school leavers to any law or business course, rather than applying through the tertiary admission centres (*if you have not already applied through VTAC or UAC*).

Not everyone who studies at ACU comes straight from high school. You may have:

- completed Year 12 many years ago
- completed TAFE or other VET studies
- started or completed studies at another university
- been working since you left high school
- got a trade qualification.

There are students of all ages studying business. In fact, about half of our new students each year are non-school leavers, so you won't be alone.

APPLICATION CRITERIA

- Direct entry covers all undergraduate law and business courses.
- You are not currently completing Year 12 studies.
- Your application must be to study a law or business course through ACU only.
- You can supply a CV to demonstrate your experience.
- Your application may be referred to the Faculty of Law and Business for an interview if English proficiency is not demonstrated.
