In 2019, we are exploring Pope Francis' 'Culture of Encounter' - it's meaning and how it can be envisaged and enacted within a Catholic context. In two-way conversations facilitated by ACU, delegates will have an opportunity to discuss Pope Francis' vision of a 'culture of encounter' in Healthcare Leadership with members of the Vatican Curia, and with each other. The 2019 symposium includes a personally guided 2-day tour of Siena focussing on the healthcare history of Saint Catherine of Siena.

Formation Tour of Siena



The trip to Siena will focus on Siena's contribution to the changing fabric of Italian and European life in the 12th-15th centuries. This period saw a new focus on the role of the individual in church and society, which is witnessed in changes in art, town planning, architecture, and spirituality. This new outlook promoted the concern for the well-being of the individual, which saw the establishment of the

first hospitals. The weekend will principally look at Siena's engagement with healthcare in this time period through the life and work of its most famous daughter, Catherine Benincasa, simply known as Catherine of Siena. Catherine exemplified the care for the individual in their weakness and vulnerability. We will also visit Siena's original hospital, Santa Maria della Scala, which is now a museum to reflect on the relationship between pilgrimage and healthcare, the care for the soul and the care for the body, and the place of art and beauty in this endeavour.

Father Andrea Ciucci

Coordinating Secretary for the Pontifical Academy for Life



From Milan, Father Ciucci was appointed as Coordinating Secretary in November 2016, The Pontifical Academy for Life or Pontificia Accademia Pro Vita is dedicated to promoting the Church's consistent life ethic. It also does related research on bioethics and Catholic moral theology.

Rev. Dr. Anthony Ekpo

Official, Holy See Secretariat of State



Father Anthony Ekpo received his PhD in systematic theology from Australian Catholic University. He was the Pastoral Assistant to the Archbishop of Brisbane and Associate Pastor at the Cathedral of Saint Stephen, Brisbane. Father Ekpo shares his time in Rome as both Official of the Secretariat of State of His Holiness, and Chaplain for the ACU Rome Campus .

Specialising in systematic theology, ecclesiology, pneumatology, sacraments, Vatican II, the sensus fidelium, and canon law, Father Ekpo has written numerous publications.











Professor Chris Gastmans

Full Professor of Medical Ethics and Head of the Centre for Biomedical Ethics and Law at the Faculty of Medicine, KU Leuven



Chris Gastmans is Full Professor of Medical Ethics and Head of the Centre for Biomedical Ethics and Law at the Faculty of Medicine, KU Leuven. Since 2002, he is member of the Bureau (as Secretarygeneral (2002-2010), Treasurer (2010-2013) and President (2013-2015)) of the European Association of Centres of Medical Ethics (EACME) to which 66 centres for medical ethics in Europe are affiliated.

Professor Gastmans teaches Medical Ethics and Ethics of Care. He coordinates the Intensive Course Nursing Ethics and the Summer

Course Ethics in Dementia Care. He serves as an ethicist in the ethics board of European funded projects, as well as in the ethics committees of Zorgnet-Icuro and of the University Hospitals of Leuven. Gastmans is also regularly invited to be member of review panels to assess research programs of Dutch universities and to assess research proposals within the EU research program Horizon 2020.

He is a member of the editorial board of the international journal "Nursing Ethics" (SAGE, London). He writes regularly editorial comments for international journals. He also co-edited "Justice, Luck and Responsibility in Health Care" (Springer, 2013) and "Euthanasia and Assisted Suicide: Lessons From Belgium" (Cambridge University Press, 2017) He published more than 150 peer reviewed articles and book chapters on end-of-life care ethics, elderly care ethics, empirical ethics, ethics of care, and nursing ethics.

Professor Antonio Iaccarino

Extraordinary Professor of Philosophy of Law, Pontifical Lateran University



Antonio Iaccarino (Pescara, Italy, 1979) commenced as Professor of Philosophy of Law at the Pontifical Lateran University in 2017. After obtaining his Ph.D. at the Pontifical Lateran University in Rome, in 2011 he became professor of Theory of Justice at the same University. He is editorial secretary of "Monitor Ecclesiasticus" and he is member of the editorial board of "Apollinaris". He is author of two books: "Verità e giustizia. Per un'ontologia del pluralismo" (2008) and "Nessuno resti escluso. La giustizia oltre i confini" (2013).

He is also author of several juridical articles. He has taken part, as keynote speaker, at numerous international conferences in Europe. In addition, he is a lawyer in the Roman Rota Tribunal and in the Vatican City Court..











Rev. Dr. Christopher Mahar

Senior Official, Dicastery for the Promotion of Integral Human Development



Father Christopher Mahar, a priest of the Diocese of Providence in the United States, was ordained a deacon in St. Peter's Basilica in Rome in 2003 and a priest in the Diocese of Providence in 2004, where he served as parochial vicar of Our Lady of Mercy Church in East Greenwich and St. Mary's Church in Cranston. He was instrumental in the development of end-of-life guidelines for the Diocese and helped to create "A Catholic Health Care Directive for R.I. (Rhode Island)" which is used throughout the state.

In 2008 he was appointed Vice Rector of the American College of the Immaculate Conception in Leuven, Belgium where he served until June 2011. In June of 2010 he completed a Sacred Theology License (S.T.L.) in Theological Ethics from the Catholic University of Louvain. In December 2016, he earned his Ph.D., in combination with the canonical degree of S.T.D. (Sacred Theological Doctorate) in Theological Ethics, from the Catholic University of Louvain, focusing on brain injury and artificial nutrition and hydration. In April 2018 was appointed to the Dicastery for the Promotion of Integral Human Development at the Vatican.

Australia's Ambassador to the Holy See is Her Excellency Ms Melissa Hitchman, an experienced career officer with the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade. She has previously served overseas as First Secretary at the Australian High Commission in London.

In Canberra, Ambassador Hitchman has served as Director, Regional and National Security Section; Director, Intelligence Review; and Director, International Commission on Nuclear Non-proliferation and Disarmament Secretariat; and most recently, Deputy Chief of Protocol. Ambassador Hitchman was also an Adviser, International Division, in the Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet.

Ambassador Hitchman holds a Master of National Security and a Bachelor of Economics (Hons) from the Australian National University.

Ambassador Hitchman commenced in her position on 18 July 2016 and presented credentials to His Holiness Pope Francis on 8 September 2016.
