



Ritual Bodies as 'Reasonable Worship': Putting Liturgy in Proper Ethical Perspective





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Biblical and early church authors describe the entire Christian life as the worship of God, what Paul identifies as 'your spiritual worship.' Liturgy as *ritual* worship is meant to empower Christians to be 'living sacrifices, holy and pleasing to God' (Rom 12:1). Liturgy and ethics are integrally related in a sound interpretation of Christian tradition. Even so, the theological rhetoric of sacrifice, holiness, royal priesthood, and more, can be puzzling, if not provocative, for 21st century Catholics when they try to make sense of their bodily ritual worship in liturgy and sacraments. This lecture will propose that accepting the disruptive challenge such rhetoric poses to the contemporary church promises to illuminate rather than obscure the essential connection between liturgy and ethical living.
