FACTS:

- This is false. Reviews of research show that most people with dyslexia score in the normal range on intelligence/general cognitive skills.
- Requiring IQ scores to be higher than reading scores can lead to underdiagnosis of reading difficulties.

Explicit instruction programs at the Australian Literacy Clinic

The 2025 NAPLAN results show that one third of Australian students are not meeting benchmarks in literacy. While these results demonstrate that the need to address foundational literacy skills remains pressing, there is a real momentum for change. Many schools are now embracing a research-informed, explicit approach to reading and spelling, including an early focus on phonics (teaching students the direct connections between letters and sounds) and ongoing work in morphology (which helps students decode and understand word structures).

Despite this, some students will continue to need support beyond classroom instruction. For those who need this support, or face entrenched literacy difficulties, targeted interventions are essential. The Australian Literacy Clinic translates cutting-edge research into practical teaching strategies, and develops programs designed to meet a spectrum of needs. The Clinic provides one-on-one, evidence-based instruction tailored to each learner's literacy profile. Through ongoing term-time sessions and intensive school holiday formats, the Australian Literacy Clinic offers a suite of explicit instruction programs:

Advancing Literacy Foundations (ALF):

Focuses on phonics, morphology, and text-level reading practice for children needing foundational skill support.

Spelling Mastery:

Teaches sound-letter links, morphological patterns, spelling rules, and practice with regular and irregular words.

Advancing Literacy Intensive Support (ALIS):

Delivers highly customised lessons – including reading, spelling, writing, and assistive tech – for students with complex needs.

Advancing Literacy Foundations Preschool (ALP):

Gives at-risk preschoolers (e.g., young family members of people with literacy difficulties) an early boost in reading and spelling before starting school.

Writing to Advance Literacy (WALi):

Addresses a critical gap in writing instruction, tackling genres and composition for students who need more than just spelling help.

Crucially, the Clinic's interventions aren't just based on theory – they have been evaluated and published in peer-reviewed journals (e.g., <u>Francis et al., 2021</u>; <u>Kohnen, Banales & McArthur, 2021</u>), demonstrating real, reliable gains for participating students. With most programs available remotely, support reaches families in regional and remote communities who once faced barriers accessing specialist help.
