The role

The person

As the next Vice-Chancellor and President of ACU, you will be innovative, agile and strategic, with the ability to inspire staff and students. You will continue to lead the transformation of the university and continue ACU's progress as a high performing higher education provider. In doing so, you will promote and embody the university's authentically Catholic character and mission, and ensure an engaging and rewarding place of work and learning.

In leading by example, you are authentic, collaborative, personable and pastoral – yet firm and decisive as the situation requires. You understand you are part of a team, empowering and supporting others to deliver outcomes and pursue excellence in all areas of the university.

You will be commercially savvy, actively seeking and using data to support decisions and balancing educational, financial and cultural outcomes. As the leader of the university, you will embrace and capitalise on opportunities for change, communicating effectively to influence others and drive innovation.

You will act with courage and with empathy and support the university's ambition to make an impact and stand up for people in need and causes that matter.

Key responsibilities

In addition to statutory requirements, the Vice-Chancellor and President is the university's Chief Executive Officer and has wide ranging responsibility for:

- preserving and fostering the essential character of the university as a Catholic university, consistent with the mission of the Church and in the context of its beliefs, traditions and canonical legislation
- fostering, promoting and developing scholarship, research, teaching and learning; and community engagement; through:
 - graduates who are work ready and competent, ethical, committed to the common good and the dignity of the human person, able to make an impact through empathy

- world leading research, including both pure and applied research, together with scholarship with particular relevance to the intellectual and social works of the Catholic Church
- promoting, developing and delivering teaching and learning at university level, engaged with research and informed by scholarship.
- continuing the internationalisation of ACU including making sound commercial decisions that are in the interest of ACU internationally, including the continued growth of the university's Rome Campus
- ensuring sound financial management and stewardship of resources and proactively identifying and managing risks to the university's operations
- ensuring appropriate and effective external relationships including those with the Church, governments, other relevant educational institutions, principal employers of the university's graduates, business and industry, local, national and international communities, and benefactors of the university
- leading and fostering the attainment of a Catholic environment and lively community amongst the staff and students of the university
- fostering a culture of recognition of Australia's First Peoples, equity, diversity, inclusion and justice, in all university activity
- ensuring that the university contributes to society, by leading public debate, bettering quality of life through research and invention, interacting with the professions and business and enhancing the cultural life of the community.

Role in governance

More complex than most universities. ACU is a public institution, recognised and funded by the Commonwealth Government, but also a private corporation. Our incorporation allows us to conduct ourselves as a Catholic university, and means we are governed in accordance with our constitution.





The Vice-Chancellor and President is ex officio a member of the university's Senate (governing body). As such you are responsible for:

- providing informed and evidence-based advice and information from which Senate can make decisions
- implementing Senate decisions
- liaising with the Chancellor on the performance of the university, its portfolios and organisational units and respective functions
- engaging externally to both protect and develop the interests of the university
- overseeing effective workforce management and organisational culture for university staff
- performing any other function specified or delegated by the Senate, or mandated under the ACU Constitution, or under university statute, legislation or regulation as a function to be performed by the Vice-Chancellor and President; and
- reporting to the Senate and relevant Senate committees on:
- o the compliance of university operations with applicable Commonwealth and state legislation and consistent with the university's status as a private corporation
- o ensuring policies and procedures are in place across the university, which are appropriate for maintaining required levels of internal control and managing risks; and
- o developing and implementing strategies for revenue growth and diversification through prudential financial management.

Selection criteria

- 1. Demonstrated intellectual distinction and professional standing required to lead a university.
- 2. Unequivocal commitment to furthering the Catholic mission and values of the university, with a genuine capacity to foster an environment that advocates and espouses Catholic social teaching.
- 3. An innovative and inspirational leader, models expected behaviour through 'walking the talk' and personal influence, leading an effective team, motivating and inspiring others through a clear vision and plan.
- 4. Exceptional range of communication and interpersonal skills required to foster and promote good relationships with all stakeholders within the university, and with the Church, industry, government and the outside community.

- 5. Highly developed strategic, organisational, risk, financial, people and resource management capability particularly in the context of geographically dispersed campuses.
- 6. Extensive experience in higher education and demonstrated ability to influence and shape opinion on higher education and related public policy issues.
- 7. Capacity to foster and reinforce a culture of internationalisation within the university and externally through program offerings and outreach.
- 8. Known capability to achieve vision and strategy, and enhance university standing regionally, nationally and internationally.
- 9. Sensitive understanding of the legislative obligation of the university in a range of areas such as equity, work health and safety, privacy, trades practice and child protection.
- 10. Desirable: extensive senior leadership in a tertiary education institution.

Conditions of employment

The appointment will be for five years. Reappointment for any further term will be determined by the Senate after consultation with the appointee and following a review of the Vice-Chancellor and President's contribution to the university.

A competitive remuneration package appropriate to the position will be negotiated with the appointee. The package will include generous superannuation and access to the university's salary packaging scheme.


The position is located at the Vice Chancellery in North Sydney, New South Wales.

The university will meet the travelling costs and reasonable removal expenses for the Vice- Chancellor, spouse and dependent children, upon appointment.


Application process

A culture of support

Our wide range of services helps students navigate through some of the more challenging parts of uni life. We offer financial advice, study, counselling and career services, and tailored support for students with disabilities There are also support programs for elite athletes and performers, student leadership opportunities, and equity programs and scholarships.

The Core Curriculum

Our Core Curriculum is a key part of every student's ACU education – giving them time to reflect on ways they can change the world by applying the principles of Catholic Social Thought. Principles such as the common good, dignity of the human person, solidarity with others, and stewardship of the earth. The Core is unique to ACU. It challenges our students to see the world from different perspectives and engage with the world in a meaningful and transformative way. Students can elect to undertake the Core in Australia or in multiple offshore locations including Rome.

Community engagement

At ACU we're all about making an impact. We offer a huge range of community engagement and volunteering opportunities, both in Australia and overseas, and it's built in to almost all our undergraduate programs.

The staff experience

We know our number one asset is our people. It's their character, enthusiasm, and engagement that make ACU a university like no other.

We believe in showing our genuine, ongoing appreciation for the great work of our staff, and we do it by offering excellent leave and employment conditions, and by fostering a work environment where staff can grow and develop.



Gender equality

In 2020, we received an Employer of Choice for Gender Equality (EOCGE) citation by the Workplace Gender Equality Agency for the ninth consecutive year.

Some of our achievements include:

- consistently high levels of women represented in leadership roles 60 per cent of our managers are women
- a range of flexible working options accessed by many women and men
- 10-days paid leave for staff experiencing domestic violence, including access to other leave on a case by case basis
- zero tolerance for sexual misconduct.

Supporting parents

ACU has one of the most generous paid parental leave schemes in Australia. Our parental leave provisions support both birth parents and their partners, and also provide support for adoptive and foster parents. Birth parents can access up to 12 weeks' leave at full pay – as well as up to 40 weeks' paid leave at 60 per cent of their normal pay.

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples

At ACU, we understand the importance of implementing proactive strategies to help redress the disadvantage experienced by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, and our recruitment practices seek to increase employment at all levels of the University. We support prospective Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander employment by encouraging both mainstream and targeted employment.



Our place in the world

Our relationships with more than 200 universities and educational institutions around the world support education abroad, staff mobility, collaborative research, articulation and shared community engagement activities.

One in four of our Australian bachelor degree students gain international experience during their studies.

Rome Campus

We offer a broad range of academic programs at our Rome Campus which involve multiple disciplines and include rich community engagement experiences, access to leading scholars, and an opportunity to experience life in Rome by living in our purposebuilt student residence. Our campus also hosts a growing suite of research seminars, fostering collaborative research relationships in theology, philosophy and religious studies with scholars from institutions across Europe and North America, as well as Australasia.

The Rome Campus also facilitates collaboration with stakeholders in Rome including Vatican officials, and offers a venue for networking events for ACU's key Australian industry stakeholders and international partners.
