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Let's look at definitions: What is GLE? What is CBAR?

- □ GLE is a framework for internationalizing university courses.
- GLE provides opportunities to engage directly with international students.
- GLE engages faculty and students in cross-cultural learning.
- GLE has the potential to correct stereotypes.
- CBAR is a framework for incorporating community-focused and social justice-oriented research.
- CBAR aims to fortify university-community relations.
- CBAR aims to include community partners in all aspects of the research and improve the lives of marginalized communities.
- CBAR has the potential for motivating students to engage in social justice beyond the project there are involved in.

Similarities:

- Provide opportunities for students to correct misperceptions and stereotypes about local or international groups;
- Encourage critical thinking skills (e.g., why people are mistreated, underserved, oppressed, or privileged);
- Provide hands-on learning experiences; and
- Enable faculty to participate in cross-cultural and/or community-focused teaching and scholarship.
- Both GLE (unwittingly) and CBAR highlights structural and political differences between the societies engaged in the research/teaching exchange.

Differences:

- CBAR's main focus is to provide services to local CbOs with limited capacity.
- CBAR commitment to benefit the community and its residents.
- CBAR aims to promote social change as articulated by community partners.
- GLE's main focus is internationalization and providing global learning opportunities for students.
- GLE is not necessarily focused on the wellbeing of communities.
- GLE is not necessarily focused on social justice issues.
- GLE provides cost-effective international opportunities for students and faculty.

GLE at DePaul

- Associated with our permanent internationalizing goal, and the goal
 of preparing students for the reality of global labor markets.
- Exposes students to international engagement:
 - Annually 4% DePaul students participate in Study Abroad programs.
 - GLE offers international opportunities for many more.
- Structured coaching provided by international programing:
 - Proposal submission; review; coaching, and funding.

Examples of GLE Projects

- DePaul Symbiosis International U, Pune, India.
- Anthropology course: "Love, marriage and dating: U.S. and India."
- Focal Point cross-cultural research course: "Women's working lives."
- Course theme development and assignments.
- The importance of face-to-face interaction through coteaching.
- Synchronous and asynchronous interactions between students and faculty.

CBAR at DePaul

- Supported by Steans including T.A., locating a community partner (CP) and receiving field support.
- CBAR courses are designed together with a CP and are based on 10-week data collection and analysis.

■ Models include:

- Single course; 1 year or multi year.
- Multi course single discipline; 1 year or multi year.
- Multi course, multi-disciplinary; 1 year of multi year.

Examples of CBAR projects

- My themes: immigration, labor, health strategies
 - Uncovering fraudulent immigration practices.
 - Centralizing day laborers (jornaleros).
 - Exposing wage-theft in collaboration with a Chicagobased workers' center.
 - Recounting food availability and procurement in a neighborhood struggling with high rates of obesity and diabetes
 - Creating awareness about food production, preparation and consumption practices at a youth program.

CBAR and GLE Challenges

- planning quality versus quantity of data collection;
- using an assets-based approach to community engagement;
- negotiating unpredictable circumstances that arise mid-project in both GLE and CBAR;
- navigating the potential for reinforcing negative stereotypes of individuals and community;
- addressing the planning and preparation time commitments for students, CP and faculty; and
- supporting faculty with resources for sustainable partnerships with community-based organizations.

GLE & CBAR: ACU and DePaul

- Great opportunity to engage faculty and students from both institutions in cross-cultural experiences while serving community partners.
