Upholstering the Sofa: An approach to problem-posing ...

- All too often, we just look at the surface of community issues; ignore what does not appear to directly impact upon us; and turn away from what seems too overwhelming to fix
- We dismiss opportunities for making change, just like we toss out worn and broken furniture
- This approach offers a creative and safe space to critically think about what is at the root of community issues and to move toward solutions

... and problem-solving

- By collaboratively refurbishing an old sofa, we work together to peel back the layers of issues and critically analyze what emerges
- We see that the "sofa" has good bones and can still provide solid support
- We learn that we can work together in a team to re-store the "sofa"
- We recognize how all of us can play a part in creating solutions.

Teena's Legacy began in 2013 in honor of founder Jamika Smith's grandmother, Alberteen Stredrick. *Teena* as the family called her, was a very creative woman with a vibrant spirit. She was an accomplished seamstress and a self-taught interior decorator with a keen eye for fashion. Her talents and passion led her to design and model unique clothes in fashion shows that she personally hosted and coordinated in the basement of her home and different local venues. She expanded her growing business to include restoring old furniture back to its original glory. Teena and Uncle Albert, her twin brother, both ran their businesses from their garages in those days. Gabriele (Dr. G.), Founder of the Pilsen Storefront & Professor Emerita, DePaul University

After years of implementing an agile community-based teaching and learning approach that benefits from our diverse City neighborhoods as *classrooms*, Dr. G. created a loosely-knit network of DePaul University students and community residents. This group, known as *Community Connexxions*, encouraged discourse about the ~isms in our City. The mutual learning projects are grounded in liberatory education practices and the ABCD Model of community development. CC's *Urban Educated-World Ready* education activities are rooted in instructional models that are informed by principles of Metagogy, Competency-based Education, Popular Education, and Community Organizing. Upon retirement in 2019, CC was incorporated into the *Pilsen Storefront*, a community space that is home to many artistic, cross-cultural, and educational activities.
