## **ABSTRACT**

Multidimensional adjectives are ubiquitous in natural language. An adjective F is multidimensional just in case whether F applies to an object x, or pair of objects x and y, depends on how x and y stand with respect to a set of underlying dimensions of F-ness. Developing a semantics for multidimensional adjectives requires us to solve the aggregation problem: how do the application conditions of an adjective F in its positive and comparative forms depend on its underlying dimensions? Here we develop a semantics for multidimensional adjectives that incorporates aggregation functions, and we develop a choice-theoretic framework for addressing the aggregation problem using such functions. We show that a range of results from social choice theory constrain the number and kind of dimensional aggregation functions admissible in a context, and we suggest that the cardinality of the set of such admissible functions will standardly be greater than 2. We then show that this view has a range of welcome consequences for questions concerning the determinacy and completeness of multidimensional comparatives. (joint work with Brian Hedden)
