Sometimes opportunity, vision and passion align to enable the emergence of something new. In 2014 ACU's then-Vice-Chancellor, Professor Greg Craven, provided an opportunity for the **Australian Catholic Bishops Conference** (ACBC) to enter into a partnership with ACU to establish an institute for pastoral liturgy to promote the liturgical apostolate in Australia and beyond.

ORIGINS

Discussions about how to enact Vatican II's call in Sacrosanctum Concilium 44 for the territorial ecclesiastical authority to set up "some kind of Institute for Pastoral Liturgy, consisting of persons who are eminent in these matters" had increased in frequency and fervour among those working in liturgy and related areas in Australia. The idea of a national liturgical institute had been discussed at a forum of professional liturgists, sponsored by the Sisters of the Good Samaritan and the Blessed Sacrament Fathers, at Mount Saint Benedict, Pennant Hills NSW on 4-7 June 2007. A clearer vision of what such an institute might look like began to coalesce at the January 2014 Biennial Meeting of the Bishops Commission

for Liturgy (BCL), National Liturgical Council (NLC), National Liturgical Music Board, National Liturgical Architecture and Art Board, and consultants, held in Wollongong. At this meeting, NLC member and ACU academic Dr Clare Johnson presented a session titled "Liturgical Formation in Australia: present needs and future directions" for the consideration of those gathered, and together the group envisioned what sort of liturgical institute and liturgical education opportunities Australia needed.

In April 2014, taking account of the ideas raised at the Wollongong meeting, Dr Johnson and Fr Anthony Casamento CSMA, ACU's Director of Identity and Mission, prepared a detailed briefing paper on the establishment of a national centre for liturgy at ACU for the consideration of the BCL. The guiding principles for the Centre (as determined by the Wollongong meeting) indicated that it should:

- foster fruitful international connections through access to existing networks of liturgical scholars
- deliver academically rigorous and pastorally focused programs in liturgy and the sacred arts tailored for the Australian cultural context while also serving the ecclesial and academic needs of geographically proximate neighbour countries
- offer accredited high-quality liturgical education at various levels (from parish pastoral learning and professional development through to PhD) to meet the specific needs of diverse target-markets
- engage actively in both scholarly research and the production of pastorally focused publications, and

investigate the establishment of a foundation to support the Centre's future needs.


In May 2014, the Bishops' Plenary carried a motion to support the establishment of a national liturgical institute at ACU, under the auspices of the ACBC. On 20 May 2015 Professor Clare Johnson was appointed as the Foundation Director of the ACU Centre for Liturgy commencing on 1 June 2015.

10 YEARS ON

The ACU Centre for Liturgy has evolved from an initial idea into a vibrant entity with four dedicated part-time staff whose innovative educational and formational programs in liturgy, sacraments, and the sacred arts engage thousands of people annually across Australia and internationally. Among its many initiatives, the Centre serves as a resource for the Catholic Church in Australia providing:



- ongoing expert advice to bishops, dioceses, Catholic education offices, schools and parishes
- face-to-face and online practical pastoral training programs
- post-graduate academic qualifications in liturgy and the sacred arts through ACU's Faculty of Theology and Philosophy.

The vision and ongoing support of ACU for this vital initiative in partnership with the ACBC, has enabled the Centre to flourish through provision of infrastructure, resources and personnel.

PEOPLE

The Centre began with just its foundation director, Professor Clare Johnson, and has since grown into a dynamic team with a wide range of perspectives, talents and expertise. This includes Dr Paul Taylor (Assistant Director), Mrs Cathy Murrowood (Professional Specialist -Liturgy Education) and Ms Maryanne Hemsley (Program Coordinator). Former staff members Dr Jason McFarland and Ms Sharon Boyd also contributed to the Centre's operations for several years. The expertise and passion of each team member is vital for the Centre's work.

The Centre has greatly benefited from the generous and faithful strategic guidance of its Board of Advisors (established in May 2016) which has provided a thoughtful independent discussion forum for programs and future directions, ensuring that the Centre remains true to its mission and maintains good standing with both the Roman Catholic Church and ACU. The board's membership has provided a wealth of outlooks and ideas

to enrich the Centre's development and ongoing operations. Fr Anthony Casamento's support, encouragement, advocacy and guidance during the Centre's first 10 years cannot be overstated. His departure from ACU in April 2025 leaves the Centre wellpositioned to continue the constructive work he championed.

REACH

During its first 10 years, the ACU Centre for Liturgy has been invited to present programs in many of Australia's dioceses and archdioceses, including Sydney, Brisbane, Melbourne, Canberra-Goulburn, Parramatta, Bathurst, Lismore, Armidale, Wollongong, Broken Bay, Maitland-Newcastle, Wilcannia-Forbes, Ballarat, Sale, Sandhurst, and Hobart. We look forward to serving these and other dioceses in the future.

Through its online training programs, public lectures and short courses, the Centre has engaged participants from every Australian state and territory, as well as from the USA, New Zealand, Nigeria, and United Kingdom (among others). The Centre's Speaking of Liturgy podcast regularly reaches thousands of people across the world, and we were delighted when we were invited to partner with St John's University Collegeville to feature our podcast on their popular blog Pray-Tell: Worship, Wit and Wisdom every fortnight.

FUTURE

In its first decade, the ACU Centre for Liturgy has matured into an organisational unit that actively fulfills its mission and promotes ACU's Catholic identity. We are immensely grateful for the support and encouragement provided by the BCL and the ongoing cooperation of the ACBC, and for the insight provided by the Centre's Board of Advisors. We acknowledge with gratitude the continuing institutional generosity and backing provided by ACU under the leadership of Vice-Chancellor and President, Professor Zlatko Skrbis, which makes possible the important work we undertake. The privilege of facilitating pastoral formation in liturgy among the faithful, continuing the professional learning of Catholic clergy, teachers, pastoral associates, ministers, musicians, architects, and artists, and nurturing the next generation of liturgical scholars and researchers is not lost on the Centre's staff. We look forward to advancing the work of the liturgical apostolate in Australia and beyond into the future.

ACU Centre for Liturgy Highlights

PUBLIC LECTURES

In response to the Covid-19 pandemic, the Centre diversified its offerings by drawing on its international network of liturgical scholars to present a series of public lectures by luminaries including: in 2020: Rev Prof Mark R. Francis CSV, Sr Prof Julia Upton RSM; 2021: Msgr Prof Kevin W. Irwin, Rev Dr J. Michael Joncas, Rev Prof Bruce Morrill SJ; 2022: Very Rev Peter Williams AM, Rev Dr Paul Turner, Prof Julie Hanlon Rubio; 2023: Rev Prof Lizette Larson-Miller, Dr Phyllis Zagano, Prof Teresa Berger, and Rev Prof John F. Baldovin SJ.

ONLINE TRAINING PROGRAMS

In making available its accredited pastoral liturgical formation programs to Australia's geographically dispersed dioceses and parishes, the Centre has utilised best practise online education strategies in designing and presenting its renowned training programs for Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion, Communion of the Sick, and Ministers of the Word. Trials and refinements of these programs have assured their quality, practicality and ongoing pertinence.

In 2023 representatives of the Archdiocese of Lagos, Nigeria asked if we could make our Ministers of the Word program available to them. Cathy Murrowood and Maryanne Hemsley worked diligently to adapt our online training program to utilise the Nigerian Lectionary and Ordo and find a suitable time for live classes. More than 60

Nigerian participants completed this program in 2024, and a new group from Lagos has commenced study of the program in 2025.

PODCAST: SPEAKING OF LITURGY

The Centre is always seeking new ways to broaden access to quality liturgical formation, and in mid-2023 began its Speaking of Liturgy podcast. Engaging an exciting array of local and international experts, the fortnightly podcast explores a wide range of thoughtprovoking topics on Catholic liturgy, liturgical music, art and architecture, liturgy in Catholic schools, preaching, and more. With more than 50 episodes so far, we are honoured to have had Australia's Cardinal Mykola Bychok CSsR, Archbishops Mark Coleridge, Timothy Costelloe SDB, and Denis Hart, Bishop Paul Bird, Prof Gerard Moore, Sr Prof Judith Kubicki CSSF, Rev Dr Paul Turner, Very Rev Peter G. Williams AM, Fr Andrew Menke, Sr Prof Julia Upton RSM, Rev Dr Gilles Drouin, Rev Prof Mark Francis CSV, and the Centre's staff and many others as guests. We look forward to many more interesting and educational episodes to come.

POSTGRADUATE PROGRAMS AND **DOCTORAL GRADUATES**

Promoting academic study and research in liturgy and related areas is a key part of the Centre's mission. Working with ACU's Faculty of Theology and Philosophy, Professor Johnson teaches into the Graduate Certificate in Theology

Studies (Liturgy), Graduate Diploma in Theology Studies (Liturgy) and Master of Theological Studies (Liturgy) courses which she has designed in consultation with others. Those who complete these specialised programs are well prepared to undertake liturgical leadership and educational roles for Australia's Catholic dioceses, Catholic education offices, schools and parishes.

During the past 10 years, Professor Johnson has supervised three doctoral students through to completion of their PhDs in liturgical music (Dr Jennifer Wakeling), sacramental theology (Dr Daniel McGrath) and liturgical inculturation (Rev Dr Michael Wallace). She is presently supervising a fourth student working on a doctorate in sacred architecture (Maree-Elizabeth Lewis).

SYMPOSIA

On 6-8 February 2019, the Centre partnered with the National Liturgical Architecture and Art Council to present a highly engaging symposium titled 'Where Your Treasure is, There Will





Your Heart Be Also - Catholic liturgical heritage: architecture, art, artefacts'. This outstanding event featured expert Australian architects, artists and liturgical design consultants alongside leading American liturgical design consultant Fr Richard Vosko and British heritage expert Sophie Andreae.

To mark the 60th anniversary of Sacrosanctum Concilium, Vatican II's Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy, the Centre ran a highly successful scholarly symposium on 3-5 December 2023 beginning with a keynote public lecture by Rev Prof John F. Baldovin SJ. Nineteen local and international liturgical scholars presented peerreviewed research papers for discussion, a beautiful conference Mass (with Archbishop Peter Comensoli, Archbishop Patrick O'Regan and Bishop Paul Bird CSsR) was celebrated, and emerging and experienced scholars interacted in a fruitful and enjoyable environment. Papers from the symposium were edited by Professor Clare Johnson, Professor Gerard Moore and Very Rev Peter G. Williams to produce the peer-reviewed



publication SacrosanctumConcilium: Exploring Liturgical Futures (Cham Switzerland: Springer Nature/Palgrave Macmillan, 2025).



'THE CHRISTIAN'S FINAL JOURNEY'

Following an enquiry from representatives of Catholic Cemeteries and Crematoria (NSW), Professor Johnson developed the professional learning program 'The Christian's Final Journey' for clergy, funeral directors and interested laity, focusing on the theology and celebration of Catholic funerals. Reviewed and endorsed by the Archdiocese of Sydney, this program has been run in Sydney, Melbourne, Brisbane and Canberra, and is being expanded to run in other dioceses. Funeral directors receive accreditation for undertaking the program, which teaches them how to prepare and celebrate Catholic funerals according to the Church's liturgical expectations. The program's facilitation of dialogue between clergy and funeral directors is always a positive and productive experience.

BROAD SCOPE OF WORK

To reach as many people as possible, the Centre has delivered public lectures, keynote addresses, and conference workshops in Australia and overseas as well as expert engagement with the media on liturgical topics. It also publishes a triannual newsletter and other pastoral publications such as 'Celebrating the Lectionary Year A/B/C' (Mulgrave: Garratt 2019, 2020, 2021). Pastoral formation days, professional learning seminars and short courses (online and in-person) on Sacraments of Initiation, the Lectionary, and the Sacrament of Marriage have also been offered by the Centre.



The Centre sponsors a scholarship for an ACU postgraduate student with a particular interest in studying liturgy and sacraments and subsidises programs for rural and regional dioceses with fewer resources. It also facilitates the Liturgy Nexus (an online network for those qualified and working in liturgy and related areas in Australia) and prepares and directs major liturgies for ACU. We are eager to continue our work in all of these areas in the future.
