

2023 ACU Cardinal Pell Leadership Program

In collaboration with Sydney Catholic Schools

The Cardinal Pell Leadership Program provides leadership formation for Catholic school leavers through an immersion in the Catholic tradition and Western civilisation.

THE PROGRAM:

- focuses on some of the major themes arising from the history of the Church and the development of the West
- uses a range of teaching modes and learning activities
- deepens participants' reflections on their own faith and sharpens their intellectual curiosity about the traditions to which they belong
- serves as a foundation for their own leadership and service after school.

The 2023 program will run from 18 November to 9 December (departing Australia 17 November and returning on 10 December), with two weeks in Rome and one week in London. Three modules will be taught, each comprising four lessons, assigned readings and visits to significant sites related to the theme of each teaching session.

The program is designed for students who are committed to their faith and have a record of leadership and service to their school, parish or the wider community. Participants do not need to be strongly academic, but they do need to be willing to read the course materials, engage positively with the discussions and site visits, and be willing to cultivate an interest in the ideas and influences that have helped to shape religion, arts, politics and society in the West.

CARDINAL GEORGE PELL



The Cardinal Pell Leadership Program was established in 2018 as the ACU School Leavers Program. The program was developed from an idea first proposed by Cardinal George Pell,

who was Archbishop of Melbourne (1996 – 2001), Archbishop of Sydney (2001 – 14), and Prefect of the Secretariat for the Economy in the Vatican (2014 – 19). The program was renamed to honour him following his death in January 2023.

Cardinal Pell had a life-long commitment to education and to encouraging young people. He was a strong advocate for Catholic primary and secondary schools, and served on many Catholic education bodies. He played a key role in the creation of ACU and served as its first pro-chancellor. As Archbishop of Melbourne, he established the John Paul II Institute for Marriage and the Family to promote teaching and research on marriage, family and bioethics. As Archbishop of Sydney, he brought the University of Notre Dame Australia to the east coast, and with it, Sydney's first Catholic medical school and first Catholic law school. He also strongly supported the establishment of Campion College as Australia's first Catholic liberal arts college.

Cardinal Pell's work in education has helped to change the lives of many young people, as has his expansion of university chaplaincies, the hosting of World Youth Day in 2008, and the program for school leavers and young leaders in Catholic schools which he inspired at ACU.

Teaching

The program consists of three teaching modules, each comprising four lessons, readings and site visits.

TEACHING MODULES

- The Church and the West: An overview of key periods in the development of the Church and its influence in shaping the Western world, from the beginnings of Christianity to the Renaissance.
- Ideas which shaped the Church and shaped the West: An exploration of some of the major ideas and challenges shaping the Church and the West, and how they influenced our understandings of politics, religion, knowledge and society.

• The democratic world and papal teaching: An introduction to how recent popes have thought about democracy and the challenges of the modern world, and the Catholic response to them.

READINGS

Assigned reading for each teaching session comprises short, selected excerpts from:

- Tom Holland, *Dominion: The Making of the Western Mind* (Little, Brown: 2019)
- a specially compiled reader of primary and secondary sources.

think tank. Before joining ACU in 2015, he worked for Cardinal
George Pell AC during his time as Archbishop of Melbourne and then
Sydney. He was a Visiting Fellow at the Ethics and Public Policy Center,
Washington DC, in 2006 – 07, and completed the Oxford Advanced
Leadership and Management Program at Säid Business School at the
University of Oxford in 2014.



Dr Patrick Quirk BA, LLB (UQ), LLM (Tübingen) PhD (Adelaide) Dr Quirk is Associate Professor in ACU's Thomas More Law School, and a former tenured Associate Professor and Academic Dean at Ave Maria School of Law in Naples, Florida, USA. He holds degrees in law and arts from the University of Queensland, as well as a Master of Civil Laws (Magister Legum) from the University of Tübingen, Germany. He is also a scholar-in-residence at St Mary's College at the University of Melbourne.

Mrs McIlroy is an English, literature and history teacher. She has taught in public and private schools in Victoria and, as a teacher of Renaissance history, has been part of and organised tours of Italy for secondary students.

Ms Bortolin has spent 18 years as a teacher in Catholic secondary colleges in Melbourne and Perth where she also held leadership roles as English Faculty Coordinator, Year Level Coordinator and Learning Enrichment Coordinator. For 16 years, she has been living in Italy where she runs an English language services business. She has often accompanied Australian school groups on Italian cultural tours.
