## **Black Lives Matter: Monuments and Memories of the Racial Past**

Black Lives Matter protests following the death of George Floyd have sparked fresh debate about monuments to historical figures and their place in liberal democratic societies still wrestling with big questions around racism and its legacies. From statues of Confederate generals in the United States to Winston Churchill in Britain to Captain Cook in Australia, many have advocated for the removal of these monuments, arguing that they trivialise the racism of the past, and 'do not move us closer to justice' in the present. Others have angrily resisted such arguments, charging those who have made them with attempting to rewrite history to serve contemporary political agendas. In this era of intense 'culture war', how do we reconcile our history with the present? What would a genuinely shared history of race look like in our times? How do we get there?
