Dr Felix Waldmann

Felix Waldmann studies early modern European intellectual history and the history of political thought. He is editing the critical edition of Locke's Two Treatises of Government and Hume's Dialogues Concerning Natural Religion for OUP, and he is completing a book on political thought and philosophy in eighteenth-century Naples and Sicily for the Ideas in Context series with Cambridge University Press. He has published in The Journal of Modern History, Historical Journal, Modern Intellectual History, and the Journal of British Studies. His latest article on Neapolitan history appeared in December's Journal of the Warburg and Courtauld Institutes.



"Gianvincenzo Gravina, maternal dominium, and Thomas Hobbes in Rome, 1699-1714"

My talk is on Gianvincenzo Gravina's *Originum juris civilis* (Naples, 1708) and its discussion of Thomas Hobbes's conception of 'maternal *dominium*'. Gravina's work is the first published examination of Hobbes's *De Cive* or *Leviathan* in Italy. The paper asks why Gravina decided to criticise Hobbes's conception of a mother's right to her child in the state of nature; what this might tell us about the intellectual culture of late Counter-Reformation Rome; and what we might learn about the European reception of this highly unusual aspect of Hobbes's work.
