
ABOUT THIS FRIDAY FORUM

English studies have been significantly impacted over recent years by a shift in focus from literary history to creative writing. This has had implications for curriculum planning and hiring in higher education, as well as influencing discussions of literary works in the broader public sphere. Autofiction, combining elements of autobiography and fiction, has become an increasingly recognisable form, and in the era of the "Voice" it also carries increasing political resonances. The panelists for this Friday Forum discuss these issues from a variety of perspectives.
